Congratulations, on helping us reach a momentous milestone this month! On May 18, 1885 the Burlington City Council enacted Ordinance 21 shifting our library from a private, subscription model to a 'free' public model. We have since then been a tax-funded institution and have maintained public access to our collection for 140 years.

This model of collective stewardship is common amongst our municipal departments (police, fire, parks, libraries) but is one that has been all but eliminated in the wider arena of American life. I am fairly certain that if libraries did not currently exist, and we were to propose the idea of them to our lawmakers today it would be quickly shut down and rejected. Our world prioritizes individualism, is more and more digital, Al is rapidly influencing and participating in our collective lives, fewer people are reading physical books, and everyone seems to despise paying taxes.

Yet... libraries defy all odds and remain to be thriving community hubs. Library services certainly look different today compared to what they were in 1885, however the ethos and mission of the Burlington Public Library remains true to the core tenant of providing access to information. Enshrined on the East side of the 1898 library building (now the Des Moines County Heritage Museum, 501 N 4th St.) is a phrase that has stood the test of time, and remains true to this day, "Dedicated to the advancement of learning."

A lot has changed in the last 140 years, and if our library walls could talk, they would have stories to rival the ones stacked on our shelves. Keep an eye out on our website for a new library history page, where we will tell the amazing and dramatic story of our library's history. In the meantime, thank you for being a part of the latest chapter of the Burlington Public Library.

BEYOND THE BOOK CLUB


Thursday, May 15 || 12-1 PM

"Uncommon Measure" explores the intricate relationship between time, consciousness, and music through the lens of a young Korean American violinist. After performance anxiety derails her dream of becoming a concert soloist, Hodges embarks on a journey of self-discovery. Blending personal narrative with illuminating research in neuroscience and quantum physics, she reflects on family, prejudice, and the search for meaning. Through this genre-defying memoir, Hodges reimagines a life once defined by classical music, now moving toward the freedom of improvisation.
